Approve Minutes

Motion by Mayor Plummer, seconded by Brooks, approving the minutes of May 28, 2019 regular meeting. Motion carried by roll call vote of 5-0 with Allen-Edwards, Galbraith, Brooks, Perraut and Plummer voting Aye.

Public Comment

J.D. Chaney, Deputy Executive Director of Kentucky League of Cities, provided a 2019 Legislative Session Overview, siting 13 KLC Legislative Agenda Items were approved. KLC supported 64 bills and 48% passed. KLC Opposed 38 bills and only 1 passed. A booklet was provided to each member of the Commission outlining the accomplishments.

Stacy Chambers a Representative from Rumpke was not able to attend however she submitted a report that was distributed to the Commission and read by Mike Withrow.

- 3,095 Residential customers and 355 Commercial customers.
- 5 loads equivalent to 36.75 tons of recycling materials was delivered to LFUCG. Rumpke is currently diverting all recyclables to Cincinnati until LFUCG starts accepting paper again.
- December 2017 thru May 2018 441 loads hauled, 4,107.50 tons disposed with \$ 180,425.59 in charges.
- December 2018 thru May 2019 121 loads hauled, 927.49 tons disposed with \$ 51,536.43 in charges.

The report reflected a reduction of 320 loads hauled thru the transfer station, and a reduction of 3,180.01 tons disposed thru the transfer station with a savings of \$ 128,889.16.

Motion by Brooks, seconded by Perraut, approving the surplus of vehicles and equipment from the Wastewater Treatment Plant. Motion carried by roll call vote of 5-0 with Allen- Edwards, Galbraith, Brooks, Perraut and Plummer voting Aye.

Executive Session

Motion by Brooks, seconded by Galbraith, to go into executive session for deliberations on a potential future acquisition of real property by a public agency, but only when publicity would be likely to affect the value of a specific piece of property to be acquired for public use or sold by a public agency, pursuant to KRS 61.810(1)(b) at 10:56 a.m. Motion carried by roll call vote of 5-0 with Plummer, Perraut, Brooks, Galbraith, and Allen-Edwards voting Aye.

Paul Gibson on the behalf of Citizen-Advertiser objected to the motion to go into executive session stating that the amount of the County's existing offer on property located on Millersburg Road was a matter of public record and consequently that no discussion by the City Commission in open session could affect the price of the property.

City Attorney Bryan Beauman responded to the objection and addressed the purpose of the executive session. He explained the City Commission would be discussing the potential acquisition with the County of the subject property on Millersburg Road but that the discussion would be related to the price the City would be willing to offer in response to the seller's counter-offer and to also discuss and review negotiation strategy. He further explained that if the mere purpose of the executive session were to simply discuss whether the City would agree to halve the specific price the County offered, then that decision and acceptance of the proposal would be in open session. However, since the purpose of the executive session was for the City Commission to consider and deliberate over the maximum price it would be willing to offer for the property so that amount could be ascertained in advance of negotiations, as well as the City Commission determining the best negotiating strategy, that any publicity or public knowledge of the City's maximum bargaining price and strategy would likely affect the value price of the specific piece of property on Millersburg Road. Otherwise, the seller would know the maximum amount of money the City would be willing to spend and bargain no lower than that amount which was not in the public interest.

With no action taken during executive session. Motion by Brooks, seconded by Mayor Plummer to exit executive session and resume regular session. Motion carried by roll call vote of 5-0 with Plummer, Perraut, Brooks, Galbraith, and Allen-Edwards voting Aye.

Doors were opened to the public for re-entrance of the regular session.

Motion by Galbraith, seconded by Brooks, to designate Commissioner Matt Perraut to confer with County Judge Executive, Michael Williams and negotiate with representatives of the owner of real property located at 1054 Millersburg Road, Paris KY in order to convey counter-offers for a joint option to purchase real property by the County and City all of which is subject to and consistent with the monetary authority as discussed and granted to Commissioner Perraut.

City Attorney Beauman stated that the purpose of this motion was only to provide Commissioner Perraut with the ability to engage in settlement negotiations to reach a potential price at which to purchase the land at 1054 Millersburg Road and that any decision to enter into any written contract for the option to purchase the property for a specific price would be subject to the approval of the City Commission and would have to be done at a subsequent meeting.

Motion carried by roll call vote of 5-0 with Plummer, Perraut, Brooks, Galbraith, and Allen-Edwards voting Aye.

With no other action or discussion, the meeting moved to adjourn.

Adjourn

Motion by Galbraith, seconded by Perraut, to adjourn the meeting at 12:04 p.m. the motion carried to adjourn. Motion carried by roll call vote of 5-0 with Allen-Edwards, Galbraith, Brooks, Perraut and Plummer voting Aye.
